Course Syllabus

Summary:

This course introduces you to the study of Western art music of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. You will become familiar with some of the composers and performers of this era while learning about major themes and issues that arise in the Western art music cultures of this period. You will also learn the basics of writing a your own music history, from analyzing primary sources and music to revising your paper for resubmission, and you will learn how to research and verify stories from music history.

The course is divided into three units based on periods (1800–1860, 1860–1940, 1940–2023). Within each of those units, we will cover the same time period from three different perspectives.

Goals:

By the end of this course you should be able to:

- · Recognize important musical styles of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries
- · Hold a discussion about our weekly themes with an expert
- Read an academic paper in music history
- Research a topic in music history, using primary sources, and write a paper about that topic
- Investigate myths and rumors about classical music

Assignments and Grades:
